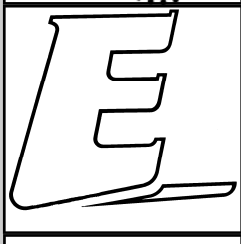

Annual Health and Medical Record Update

The Annual Health and Medical Record was released in December 2008, and its use became mandatory on January 1, 2010. The latest update to the record consolidates all records from the National Council and the three national high-adventure base forms, enabling a single medical form to be used across all BSA activities. The new form, bin No. 680-001, supersedes the previous, catalog No. 34605; this new item should be phased in immediately as it renders the old forms obsolete.

The Annual Health and Medical Record is required for participation in all Scouting events, including day and resident camps and high-adventure bases. It should be updated no less than annually.

Highlights/changes with the 2011 update:

- The record now lives on an interactive web page on Scouting Safely. Scouts, Scouters, parents and staff can download, fill in, and print it on standard paper, and can save an electronic copy for their personal files. The link is now live at <http://www.scouting.org/scoutsource/HealthandSafety/ahmr.aspx> and should be substituted for any outdated links you may have hosting the record.
- Parts A and B-the health history and release statement-will be utilized the most.
- Part C is the physical exam.
- Part D is a review piece for participants attending any of the national high-adventure bases.
- The record 680-001 supersedes and is the equivalent for meeting day and resident camp standard requirements that for 2011 still reference No. 34605.
- Local councils should not modify the medical record. If customization is deemed necessary, please contact us at health.safety@scouting.org.

The frequently asked questions (FAQs), <http://www.scouting.org/scoutsource/HealthandSafety/Resources/MedicalFormFAQs.aspx>, have been updated to reflect the changes in the record. We strongly encourage councils to highlight the link to the FAQs; experience indicates that 95 percent of the questions we receive are answered on this page.

Introduction to Leadership Skills for Crews (ILSC) Now Available Online!

The purpose of the Introduction to Leadership Skills for Crews course is to teach crew members with leadership positions about their new roles and how to most effectively reach success in that role. It is intended to help Venturers in leadership positions within their crew understand their responsibilities and to equip them with organizational and leadership skills to fulfill those responsibilities. Introduction to Leadership Skills for Crews is the first course in the series of leadership training offered to Venturers and is a replacement for the Venturing Leadership Skills Course. Completion of Introduction to Leadership Skills for Crews is a prerequisite for Venturers to participate in the more advanced leadership courses National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) and the National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (NAYLE). It is also required for Kodiak.

WOOD BADGE 2011

Any adult 18 years of age or older who is currently registered in the Boy Scouts of America may attend Wood Badge at Camp C.S. Klaus if they have completed the specific leader training for their Scouting position. They also must have a complete and current BSA annual Health and Medical Record completed prior to the start of the course.

The course dates are:

Pre-Course meeting—Sunday, July 31

First Weekend—August 12, 13 and 14
(7:30 AM Friday thru 4:00 PM Sunday)

Second Weekend—September 16, 17 and 18
(7:30 AM Friday thru 4:00 PM Sunday)

Course Cost: \$240 A minimum deposit of \$50 is due with completed application. Balance is due by July 12, 2011 (\$25 discount if paid in full by 5/12/11).

From the Desk of the District Executive



After the last couple of brutal winter months, this brief warm up has me thinking about spring. For me, it's a season that conjures the ideas of rebirth, renewal and re-growth, but what is spring's character? How can we define spring? I realize that the exact timing of "spring" varies according to local climate, cultures and customs. Perhaps to the individual Scout, the character of spring is unique as well.

To the Scout studying Weather Merit Badge, spring is merely a climatic gap between winter and summer. To him spring is the value of temperature averages and is as ephemeral and fleeting as autumn. He will continue to note that, with the changing season, unstable weather occurs more often during spring. Warm air begins to invade from lower latitudes, while cold air is still pushing hard from the Polar Regions. Spring storms bring flooding, lightning strike and of course—and especially here in Iowa, "Tornado Alley" as they call it—the dreaded twister. As the days begin to get longer and longer, the Scout studying Astronomy Merit Badge would say that spring comes at the vernal equinox, which will be March 20th. He will continue to explain that during the equinox, the tilt of the Earth's axis is slanting neither away from nor towards the sun. At this time the center of the sun is in the same plane as the Earth's equator, resulting in a day which is just as long as its night. The astute eye of the Scout studying Nature Merit Badge will notice the blossoming of plant species, the restless stirring of animals, or perhaps the unique smell of spring soil coming back to life. To the civically minded Scout, spring marks the time for many public holidays. May Day of course being synonymous with International Workers' Day, or Labor Day, a celebration for the social and economic achievements of the labor movement. And of course with the smell of fish fries lingering in the air, the reverent Scout will mark spring by Easter, the most important religious feast in the Christian Calendar.

As you can see, the definition of spring varies from Scout to Scout, by our culture, climate, and by the specific weather of any given year. Let us all embrace the regenerative qualities of this season, let us all renew our Scout Oath, embrace the diversity of thought that this season brings, and rethink how our Scouting program can change the lives of the young people in this council.

His host parents found this to be particularly unsettling and tried to ask the young man what he wanted to do. Instead of replying verbally, he grabbed something to write with and drew a picture of boys camping and sitting around a fire. With that, the host parents contacted the local Boy Scouts of America and got this young boy involved with the local Boy Scout Troop. This boy who was away from his family, no friends, and a large language barrier suddenly was thrown into the world of Scouting. Scouting soon became this boy's love as he found a family away from his family and friends that he would have the rest of his life. Eventually, the boy became much happier, started to learn new skills with his new friends, including some English, and began to turn into a happy young boy who was learning with the rest how to become a strong young man. Eventually, this boy received the highest rank in our program—Eagle Scout, graduated from college, and decided he wanted to give back to the Scouting program by becoming a Scouting Professional himself. This man currently serves at the National Office as the Director of Multi-Cultural markets.

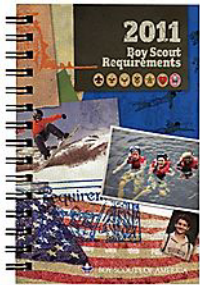
